

ANNOUNCEMENTS – It was announced that Debbie Weitz has resigned from Council as President. The Vice-President, Eileen Duffy, will now become President. A search will begin for a new Vice-President, who will be elected in August.

TASK FORCE REPORTS

Parish Life: On April 8, Archbishop Schnurr conferred the Sacrament of Confirmation to our 7th and 8th graders. On April 20, our Easter Vigil Mass began with the beautiful candle lighting ceremony. After the Mass and service, at which two catechumens were received into the Catholic Church, a reception of celebration was held for the new Catholics, their families and guests, along with members of the parish. On Easter Sunday, April 21, the annual Easter Egg Hunt for children was held following 11:30 a.m. Mass. Jesus Day occurred on May 4, this year. For our second graders, this is the practice day for their big First Communion Day which follows on Sunday. Our annual Parish Picnic was held on May 10, this year at Stricker's Grove. On May 20, our Eighth Grade finished their formal education at St. Martin's School and attended their final Mass as a class. The final event for this fiscal year will be the reception at the end of the two-week PSR classes on June 14.

<u>Spiritual Life</u>: Bible Study – We completed our study of St. Paul's letters to the Corinthians. Our next Bible Study is scheduled to start on Monday, September 9. This time, we will look at the Old Testament Book of the Prophet Jeremiah. Adult Faith Formation – The Adult Faith Ministry has not met for a while, but we still hope to pursue an Autumn activity around the time of our Feast Day. Book Club – We just completed our discussion of the book, <u>The Other Wes Moore</u> by Wes Moore. Our next Book Club selection will be <u>When Breath Becomes Air</u> by Paul Kalanithi. This is a posthumously published account of the author's last year of neurosurgical residency at Stanford University, as he experiences negative changes in his health.

Finance: No report. The 2019-2020 Budget, that was approved by the Finance Committee, was reviewed by the Pastoral Council Committee Members. The school enrollment is monitored closely because a certain number (roughly between 270 and 273 students) is needed to make the budget work. The enrollment always fluctuates by a few plus or minus students.

Property and Grounds: The Red School building is getting needed paint and repairs. Imbus is repairing and sealing the overhangs in the yellow building. The boiler is almost done in the yellow school building. The boiler in the red school building needs replacement. It may be relocated from the basement to the first level in what was previously the outdoor boys' restroom. The yearly cleaning of the school complex will begin in early June. There has been decluttering and spring cleaning already started in the red school building. Cheviot has provided garbage trucks to remove the trash. This year's Harvest Home parade theme is 150 years of Baseball. St. Martin's will once again participate in the parade.

I am still looking for a replacement for Mr. Martin, but I have hired a Middle school licensed Math Teacher to replace Mrs. Staarmann. We will not hire a teacher to take Ms. Pille's place – as of now, with only one Kindergarten Class, I plan to move Mrs. McDaniel to First Grade. There will be some other shuffling around with bigger classes in the Intermediate and Middle grades.

Thank you all for your prayers and support over this past school year. We have had some tough times, especially the last few weeks, and I know that you all have been praying for us. This summer break is well deserved for our entire school community.

DRE: First Eucharist/Jesus Day Retreat with Tom Sparough was a special day reserved for our youth and their parents who were celebrating First Communion. Celebration of First Eucharist was May 5, and twenty-one candidates received Jesus in the Eucharist for the first time. May Crowning - On May 14, this sacred evening in honor of our Mother, Mary, was surrounded by a strong sense of reverence and prayer. Summer Parish School of Religion Program – "Rejoice and Be Glad" is for two consecutive weeks, June 3-June 14. This special ministry is designed to provide faith formation for our Catholic youth who attend public schools, grades one through eight. During our time together, students will participate in the rich treasure of religious instruction, prayer experiences, exploration of the Word of God found in sacred scripture, Liturgical Music Appreciation and Catechetical Art Enrichment. Martinfest Preparations for the Third Annual Martinfest celebration scheduled for Saturday, November 9 is underway. The Major Award Raffle thus far has also had a fruitful response. Seven hundred tickets have been sold. Every Sunday before the 11th of the month, raffle tickets will be sold after all the Masses.

<u>Pastor's Report</u>: No report other than there have been 16 Baptisms this year so far and 3 Baptisms of school children during the year. There is a sense of welcoming at SMOT and because of the sense of welcoming a lot of former parishioners return to SMOT for Baptisms, weddings and funerals.

<u>New Business</u>: As previously discussed, a search will begin for a new Vice-President of Pastoral Council. Mary Jo Betz will move from Property and Grounds to Outreach. Property and Grounds will become an at-large position on Council.

Our next Pastoral Council meeting is scheduled for August 22, 2019, at 6:15 p.m., in the Red School.

Why Do Catholics Do That?

What is YOUR Vocation?

After the restful break of summer, fall arrives with the bustle of programs starting up and a full calendar staring us full in the face. There is always so much work to be done in the Church, because there's always a way to make anything better. But we need more help in order to do so.

The role of the laity is critical to the mission of the Church. Many times, when we talk about "the laity," we define it as what we are not: we are not the "religious," sisters, deacons, or priests. But the Church defines the word according to what we are: sharers in Christ's office of priest, prophet, and king. Our vocation as lay people comes from our Baptism and is strengthened by Confirmation.

I'm sure that not a single person reading this doubts the importance of the laity, or his or her own responsibility to be the hands and feet of Christ in the world. The difficulty comes when one is trying to discern their own calling. One suggestion would be to first listen to the Word of God. You can do this while at Mass or break open the Bible at home. Pray afterwards and see if God is leading you to a particular vocation within the Church. Make a list of your own skills, and a list of possibilities and narrow it down. Discuss it with family members and friends. Make sure the vocation to which you feel called is not contradicted by the teachings of the Church. And then take the plunge!

Here are a few vocations within our own parish that need workers:

Lectors – Lectors need to have an appreciation of the scriptures, and the maturity and ability to proclaim the readings with confidence. Good public speaking skills are needed, as well as the ability to gain and keep the assembly's attention. Anyone who has been Confirmed in the church is able to Lector at Mass.

Musicians – Choir members need to be able to match pitch and follow direction in order to learn to blend with the other singers and need to be available for rehearsals and Masses. We are in great need of new volunteers in our music programs.

Greeters – The most important qualities of a greeter are kindness and friendliness. The ability to make a good first impression is also helpful to make visitors feel welcomed into our sanctuary.

Ushers – The role of Usher requires diplomacy. Their vocation is to help direct others in order to keep a feeling of reverence, worship, and welcome in the church before and during Mass. They also take up the collection.

Gift Bearer – The role of Gift Bearer requires no pre-planning and no special skills. One simply removes the flower from the gift table before Mass to let others know you have taken on the task, and then you bring the gifts up when Fr. Terry comes down the steps to receive them. It is a beautiful gesture that emphasizes that the gifts are from our hands and offered to God.

Servers – Servers need to be able to learn the parts of the Mass and the actions needed. This has been made much easier by the development of a training manual and a YouTube video. The ability to control one's movements so as to not be distracting is helpful. We have both adults and children in this ministry.
